The Paul Robeson Cultural Center was established in 1969 as The Black House in response to the challenge of providing a supportive atmosphere to the increasing numbers of Black students entering Rutgers University. The Paul Robeson Cultural Center is considered one of the first Black cultural centers on a college campus. In 1972, the center was renamed in honor of Rutgers' esteemed alumnus Paul Robeson.

Rutgers most esteemed Alumnus, Paul Robeson was an athlete, actor, singer, cultural scholar, author, and political & social activist. Robeson received an unprecedented twelve major letters in four years and was his class valedictorian. In 1919, he became the third African-American graduate of Rutgers.

Robeson was one of the first Black men to play serious roles in the primarily white American theater. Robeson's "Othello" was the longest-running Shakespeare play in Broadway history, running for nearly three hundred performances.

He was an iconic Civil Rights Activist and an advocate for social justice and equality. As an artist and citizen, he asserted that he had no choice but to champion the cause of oppressed peoples around the world. He was one of the century's most controversial figures because of his outspoken criticism of American Racism and his unwillingness to denounce Communism.
